

A Guide to Understanding Student Reports; Years 7-9

This document explains the categories in your child's report to give you a holistic view of their progress.

The Fischer Family Trust (FFT) take all the known information about a child such as KS2 results, date of birth, and any special educational needs, and compares this with other children who have the same profile, nationally. This data provides a national benchmark for the levels of estimated achievement for each individual child. We take this data and set Expected Goals.

The FFT 20 Expected Goal (EG) is the grade that would place students in the top 20% of similar students nationally. In Year's 7 - 10, a student's FFT 20 Expected Goal places them within an ASTRA Expected Band.

This provides a target range to work towards.

A student may sit across two bands, particularly as they reach the top of one. Subject leaders will review the bands at strategic points across the year to ensure students have sufficient challenge for their ability. A student's expected band may be raised where they are consistently achieving standards of work above this range. We will strive for students to aspire beyond their FFT 20 Expected Goal.

In Terms 1 and 2, teacher assessments and classwork are used as the basis for their judgements. In term 3, the end of year exam is used to report progress. Progress against expectations is reported using the following descriptors;

Working Above	The student is currently producing work to a standard above their expected Astra band
Working At	The student is currently producing work to a standard within their expected Astra band
Working Towards	In order to reach their expected Astra band, the student needs to act on advice and guidance from their teachers to develop their understanding in key topics
Requires Intervention	The student needs to develop their knowledge and understanding in identified areas to reach their expected Astra band

We also report on students' Attitude to Learning. This is an assessment made by teachers, using the following criteria;


